At left is a gavel made by Rod Howard who was unable to attend the meeting. The head of the gavel is an Indoor Bowl made from Lignum Vitae, a naturally dark wood. Rod turned the handle from a piece of Brigalow and it is a good match without having to be stained. Well done Rod.



Above and right are pictures of a table that Stewart Upton has made. The legs are from an old table which have been sanded to remove the old stain. The top is also from an old table and it complements the legs with grace and charm. The new table will have pride of place in Stewart's Study. The end result looks great. Well done again Stewart.



At left is a wall Mirror frame made by Bob Parrish. The frame is made from a variety of timbers collected as "road kill" by Stewart Upton. It proves the point that one man's rubbish is another man's treasure.

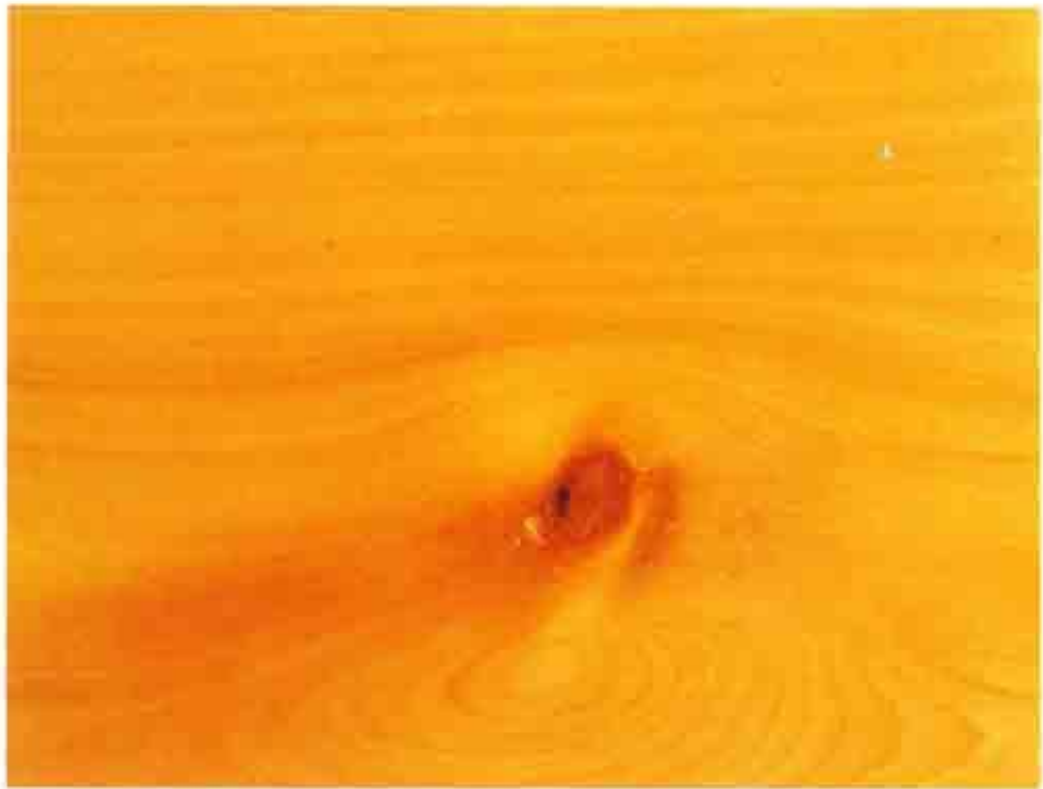

Pictured at left is something not made by Col Bridgeman but an item he brought along showing the latest in fashions made from cork. The cork is removed in a thin layer and does not affect the life of the tree as additional shavings can be made in future years.

The cork is very soft to touch and looks great. It is always amazing to see what we can do with items from nature without spoiling the environment. Thanks, Col, for bringing along this item.

Huon Pine



BOTANICAL NAME: *Dacrydium franklinii*

OTHER COMMON NAMES: White Pine, Macquarie Pine.

TREE DESCRIPTION: Huon Pine is a medium to tall softwood, which grows only in the cool temperate high rainfall areas of South Western Tasmania. It is one of Australia's longest-lived species. The tree occasionally reaches heights of up to 38m (125ft) and 1.9m (6ft) in diameter. Normally, it is less than 20m tall.

COLOUR: The sapwood is pale, very narrow and is not easily distinguishable from the heartwood, which is light cream to yellowish-brown in colour.

GRAIN AND TEXTURE: It is usually straight grained, with fine growth rings closely spaced, giving it a very fine and even texture. Sometimes, it exhibits a beautiful birds-eye figure. (The most valuable figure is acquired from full burl or near burl.)

DENSITY: Air dry density is approx. 520kg/m³.

STABILITY: Huon pine is a very stable timber — favoured for boat building due to its low shrinkage and high stability.

DURABILITY: It is a very durable timber, noted for its resistance to decay, primarily due to the presence of the essential oil — Methyl eugenol. It is not susceptible to attack by Lyctus borers.

WORKING PROPERTIES: Huon Pine is a moderately light and soft wood with a fair degree of strength. Sometimes it has a rather oily feel on freshly planed surfaces. It saws and machines very easily to a smooth finish, and does not readily blunt tool edges. Nailing and screw holding ability is good. Gluing is satisfactory, although resorcinol and epoxies may present problems. It has good steam bending properties. Freshly cut wood has a very strong and distinctive resinous odour. It can be worked to a high polish and usually accepts finishes well.
