### TV, Hot water and solar panels project

Secretary, Graham Ethell, advises: "As you are aware this project received grant funding from the Australian Government and the Club is very grateful for this financial support.

The project is now complete, with the installation of the solar panels on the Workshop roof in late August. The TV and hot water unit were installed in the Gallery earlier this year.

For the technically minded, here is some information about the solar panels. It's a  $6.75 \, \text{kW}$  solar system, comprising  $18 \times 375 \, \text{W}$  panels. The daily electricity generation ranges from  $16 \, \text{kWh}$  in June to  $34 \, \text{kWh}$  in December. The estimated annual savings in our electricity bill is \$2,240.

There is a sub board installed in the office and both the Club and the installer can access information about the system, including power generated and reports on its operating efficiency.

Hopefully we will be able to reopen the Club at some stage soon so we can get the benefit of the free power!"

### Ray Tregoning's Bits & Pieces

While locked down and doing a few things I needed to use my Coping Saw. The trick was to find it among my many toolboxes from years ago. While looking I uncovered my bit roll and braces used in the days before battery drills, hole saws, etc.

These augers and braces I used all the time in those "good old" days. I have the set of door bits for boring all the holes for the locks, along with 2 expansive bits, each having two interchangeable cutters allowing you to bore holes with one from 1" (25.40mm) to 2

5/8" (66.67mm) with the other auger from 7/8" (16.66mm) to 3" (76.20mm).





Also, in the bit roll there are screwdriver bits both for slotted screws and Phillips head. I have no idea why I have three braces, but along the way these things just build up over the years.

By the way, I did find my Coping Saw and spare blades to go with it.

## SHOW & TELL

### Neil Mathews advises on how to make a steel bucket for a toy excavator.

"When making a toy that a kid is going to use in the dirt it needs to be compact and strong. As well as being a "wood butcher" I am also a "tin basher".

To make the bucket all I had was the photo of the toy I wanted to build so I enlarged the photo and worked out the dimensions of the bucket. My idea was to make this in one piece of 1mm thick galvanised sheet metal. I then spent ages using geometry to work out the angles to make a template and that proved a failure.


The next approach was to enlarge the side view of the bucket to the actual dimensions I wanted, print it out then cut it to make a cardboard template. Then using this template and rolling it along a large sheet of cardboard I marked out the body of the bucket, added the width and where the bends should go. I then added the side profile to each side of the slope and added 10mm on each side of the body for folding. This produced a large template that I folded up to check it would work.

With the template now OK I used the template to mark out the sheet metal and cut it with tinsnips. I then folded the 10mm bits in a vice. Next, I cut a block of hardwood to the width and vertical height. I clamped the block to my bench on top of the sheet metal and folded it around the block. This all worked but left some soldering of the folds to be done.

This proved a problem initially, but I remembered as a kid up bush I used to watch a guy making corrugated galvanised water tanks. He used to paint the joins with spirits of salts then "glue" it together with a blowlamp-heated soldering iron and a stick of solder. Spirits of salts I found is now called hydrochloric acid and available from Bunnings.

I used a small brush to coat the edges,

heated the job from outside with blowlamp and applied solder to the joint success! Cleaned up and gave it a coat of primer then painted, finiob ished.

This time to store some of his "state of the art" electronic test equipment - (state of the art circa 1965 )- but they still work.

Peter uses 18mm particle board because it is cheap, easy to work and dimensionally stable. Each box is of a custom size and include internal spacers to hold the



equipment secure. Joined with glue and dowels, then given a couple of coats of Cabots water based "Cabothane Clear" Polyurethane. Hinges, handles and latches are from McJings at Yagoonga.

### David Edwards has made a router sled for the club

I know some of you are aware that I've been working on a router sled during lock-down with input from Ian Rudd, Roger Dixon and Ray Tregoning.

This project started prior to lockdown with a discussion on the drum sander being used as a thicknesser with the resultant sanding belts abnormal wear, tear, and build up of glue deposits.

In my home workshop I have had a very basic router sled made from plywood that I've used for the past couple of years for flattening end grain cutting boards prior to sanding. I took it along to the club and demonstrated its use and we decided that we should make one for the club that is used for initial flattening of boards prior to either drum sanding or using the Mirka sander. The problem with my basic design is that a huge amount of dust is generated and the planer bit in the router throws it everywhere.

So I started to explore ideas for a DIY sled with dust extraction and came up with an idea to adapt a dust shoe that a YouTuber had built for his CNC router. So using Sketchup I designed a sled with a manual height adjustable dust shoe (the CNC guy's was digitally adjustable but that was a bit too clever for me) and made a prototype from some old MDF shelving. That enabled me to test out whether the dust shoe and extraction idea worked or not. It worked brilliantly.

So then the discussion moved on to making one with linear bearings and rails. So back to SketchUp and refinement of the design and I decided to build one from aluminium plate mounted on the linear rails.

Attached is a PDF series of photos and a few comments. After lockdown we can try it out at the club and collectively brainstorm any ideas for improvement

I suggest it be located back to back with the lathe and connected into the lathe dust system.

#### **Profile of member: Neil Mathews**

"I am a bush electrician from Peak Hill NSW. I came to Sydney in 1959 to get my electrician's licence. I worked in a variety of electrical industries and completed my Electronics and Communications Certificate.

In 1968 I was employed by GE and after 6 months overseas training as a Numerical Control service engineer. I became responsible for 20% of all the Numerical Control Machines in Australia (there was less than 100 NC machines in 1968) I serviced and commissioned NC machine tools, many the first of their types in Australia.

After 6 years with GE I started my own business Numericon Pty Ltd, the first company in Australia to specialise in Numerical Control. I started in service work, but soon I was asked to retrofit existing machines to NC and CNC.

This led to being asked to design machines that did not exist or were unavailable in Australia. As the components I needed were not readily available in Australia, I had a pick of the best components on the world market and established imports and exclusive distribution rights in Australia for over 12 manufacturers in USA & Europe of sensors, motors, controls, actuators, gear reducers, and tooling.

I imported these parts for our systems and established a spare parts facility for existing NC machines. I was always good at circuit design and machine design seemed to come naturally. Numericon expanded to a maximum of 10 employees.

We became a preferred supplier to Ford Geelong where we automated all the sheet metal blanking lines Our last system at Ford was the design and build of a valve-train assembly line for the Falcon 6 cylinder engine. Our machine was 10 metres long and assembled some 280,000 units.

We introduced the concept of Flexible Manufacture to Australia and designed a high-speed feeder system that was used for many applications such as multi-tool manufacture of steel components, aluminium windows, and tube cutting. Our business was mainly control systems and service, but we built and automated many special purpose machines as well.

We designed a number of CNC sheet metal systems and were able to achieve performance and accuracy matching anything available in the 1980's worldwide. In 1994 we responded to an expression of interest from State Transit following the deaths of two children being caught in closing bus doors.

We designed and installed the first 350 door safety systems in new Sydney buses. The specification we designed became part of the national standard for bus door safety. I retired in 2004 with a record that every system and machine we built worked to customer's specification.

We then spent the next ten years with our Bushtracker Caravan exploring 150,000Km of outback Australia before re-

The chassis and rear doors are made from West Australian Sheoak, the engine bonnet is

Black Heart Sassafras, the grille is Australian Red Cedar and the sides are Kauri.
